Safeguarding is everyone's business: safeguarding during Covid-19

The Coronavirus Act 2020 Annex D: Safeguarding Guidance was published on 1 April 2020, and says:

- Safeguarding adults remains a statutory duty of Local Authorities to keep everyone safe from abuse or neglect;
- The Coronavirus Act 2020 does not change safeguarding under the Care Act, especially Section 42;
- It is vital that there is the same level of safeguarding;

"Local Authorities, social care providers, the health, voluntary sector and our communities must continue work to prevent and reduce the risk of harm to people with care and support needs, including those affected by Covid-19"

View Coronavirus Act 2020 Annex D: Safeguarding Guidance All SAB partners are working together to ensure that safeguarding services in County Durham for those most at risk are affected as little as possible. As lead agency for safeguarding, Durham County Council continues to prioritise the prevention and protection of adults.

Covid-19 and safeguarding concerns

If you think an adult is at risk of abuse, neglect, or self-neglect, these usual processes continue to apply.

① If the person is in immediate danger call 999 straight away. To report abuse or neglect you can:

- Call Social Care Direct 24 hours a day on 03000 26 79 79. A trained officer will listen carefully to your concerns, give advice and take a referral if necessary, even if you want to remain anonymous.
- If you have concerns that someone is a victim of modern slavery or human trafficking, contact the police on 101.
- If you are a patient or visitor to a hospital or other health facility, you should immediately report your concerns to a member of staff.

Self-Neglect Briefing

"When working with people who self-neglect, multi-agency working is essential. It provides an opportunity for increased collaboration; shared decision making and provides potential for a more creative approach to engaging with the person".



Training update for Covid-19

"Employers must ensure that staff, including volunteers, are trained in recognising the signs and symptoms of abuse or neglect, how to respond, and where to go for advice and assistance".

County Durham SAB reflection

As we've come to the end of the financial year 2019-2020 it's a good moment to reflect upon the achievements of the previous year and ahead of our new 2019-2020 annual report. A key message of partnership working is to ensure that safeguarding is everyone's business.

The LSAB agreed a 3-year plan for 2018-2021 which includes four priorities and streamlined working groups of the LSAB across four key themes:

- Prevention and Early Implementation
- User/Carer Voice and Awareness Raising
- Performance, Quality and Governance
- Safeguarding Adult Reviews Learning and Training.

The LSAB had continued its focus on the service user voice to inform good practice and a deeper understanding of abuse and neglect. A service user shared his experience of abuse and how he was able to move on as a written story. The Service User Story was published as a booklet with an accompanying animated video to support adults at risk to help them understand what abuse is and how to report it.

Durham County Council (DCC) are the responsible body to carry out enquiries in response to a report that an adult may be experiencing abuse or neglect. In the year 2018-2019, 3,235 Section 42 enquiries were undertaken and in 85.6 per cent of those enquiries the risk was removed or reduced. Desired outcomes of adults involved in safeguarding enquiries is of key importance, for those enquiries 95.4 per cent their desired outcomes were fully or partially achieved.

Recent scam activity



Please be aware of two current scams in relation to the NHS 'Test and Trace'.

One scam involves contacting people to advise that they have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19. The scammer asks the person for bank card details to pay for a COVID-19 test.

NHS tests are a free service and no one will be requested to pay.

The second is a text message scam which advises people of intended COVID-19 Test and Trace home visits. Please be aware these text messages include **unsafe hyperlinks**.

The COVID Home Testing team will visit you at home on Friday 19.6.20. We will telephone on arrival, please unlock your door and then move to another room AWAY from the front door. Do not come out to meet us. All other household members and pets must stay in a different room to

We will enter your property and we will remain inside the front door to put on our protective clothing. You must wait in a separate room until we come to you.

Results will be telephoned through to you within 24-72 hours
